



Why do we oppose Sunday hunting?


Most Marylanders DON'T HUNT



A statewide poll in 2018 showed that <u>68.9%</u> of all Marylanders <u>oppose Sunday hunting</u>, while <u>only</u> 21.9% favor it.



Even in rural Maryland, 60.5% of residents oppose Sunday hunting versus only 34.1% who support it.



A DNR survey found that: Only 8% of the general population has hunted in the last two years. 84% of the general population has never hunted.

By comparison, 24% of Marylanders report making frequent or occasional trips to experience wildlife for photography or other non-hunting purposes.

Don't We Have Too Many Deer?

Q: Isn't the deer population out of control in Maryland?

A: <u>No.</u> The deer population is stable or dropping, and it does not exceed the biological carrying capacity of our natural resources.

Q: Don't we need Sunday hunting to control the deer population?

A: <u>No.</u> DNR uses bag limits to manage the deer population. Adding Sundays will not change the bag limits – it will just spread the kill over seven days instead of six.

What About the Farmers?



Q: What about farmers? Don't deer cost them thousands of dollars in lost crops?

A: <u>No.</u> Sunday hunting restrictions do not apply to farmers. The state's Deer Management Permit (DMP) program allows crop farmers to hunt deer 365 days a year.
