Letter from the Publisher

We considered several opening lines for this month's letter, each of which reflected how we felt about the weather in the middle of August, but none of which conveyed how much work we have been doing. "When the going gets hot, the hot get going." "If you can't stand the heat, get out of Annapolis." "Hey horse, why the ... hot ... face?" Whatever we tried, we couldn't get around the fact that it's summertime, and the livin' is—busy.

Why? The summer is when our Government Relations Committee gets ready for the next session of the

General Assembly. Though the session does not begin until January, this is the time when legislators start drafting bills, when non-profits start work on state bond fund requests, and when MHC solidifies its support in Annapolis. If we were to wait until the session started, we'd be out of the running.

Here's what we've been up to so far.

MHC Task Forces

We convened two task forces this summer to focus proactively on legislation for the 2022 session.

Therapy Horse Task Force: The Therapy Horse Task Force worked on strategies to expand the number of therapeutic riding facilities that qualify for veterans' services reimbursement funds. Current law limits eligibility to Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship (PATH) Premier Accredited Centers (PAC) or programs that have Equine Assisted Growth and Learning Association (EAGALA) certified professionals on staff. The task force felt that these eligibility requirements are not well-suited to the specific needs of the Maryland veterans' community, and decided that a new eligibility protocol that took the best practices of PATH and EAGALA and modified them specifically for veterans would be a better approach. Over the course of the next few months, the task force will work with the Maryland Department of Veterans Affairs to develop this protocol. We will then draft legislation to expand eligibility to those facilities that meet this Maryland-specific protocol.

In addition, the Therapy Horse Task Force will work this fall to add equine-assisted therapy to the list of therapeutic recreational activities eligible for reimbursement under the Medicaid Autism Waiver program. This will likely be a regulatory project as opposed to a legislative one.

Shared Use of Public Land Task Force: The Shared Use of Public Land Task Force has begun work on a state-wide legislative approach to keep our public lands safe and accessible to all user groups, including equestrians. This issue is of particular concern now because more Marylanders than ever are turning to outdoor recreation as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Baltimore Sun reported that in 2020, state parks saw a 45% increase in visitors, and rangers had to close 14 state parks 292 times, which was triple the amount of times they had to turn away visitors in 2019.

The task force is considering draft legislation to require farmers who lease public land to leave a 20-foot border around their fields to allow unobstructed access to trail heads, as well as draft legislation to prohibit weapons in the parks on one weekend day each week. The task force will also engage with the new legislative commission charged with studying park capacity. The commission will be headed by former Governor Parris Glendenning.

Requests from Legislators

Two legislators contacted MHC over the summer to ask for input on potential legislation for the 2022 session. Del. Mary A. Lehman (D – Anne Arundel & Prince George's) contacted us about a helmet law for minors. We conducted a membership survey in August and of those who responded, 59 members supported such a law in concept, while 7 opposed. MHC will work with Del. Lehman on draft legislation.

Del. Sara N. Love (D – Montgomery) asked MHC for input on a "right to ride" bill. MHC drafted a proposed bill for Del. Love and secured a co-sponsor for her, Sen. J.B. Jennings (R – Baltimore & Harford). The bill recognizes that equine activities: i) are a valued part of Maryland's historical, cultural and social heritage; (ii) provide unique recreational benefits to the residents of the state; (iii) contribute to state and local economies, tax revenues and employment; and (iv) support the conservation, preservation, and management of open space and natural resources using primarily private dollars. The bill says that in light of the foregoing, it is the intent of the General Assembly that Maryland residents have a right to engage in equine activities. In addition, MHC is organizing a tour of Montgomery County horse farms in District 16 this fall for Del. Love.

Other Activities

Our Government Relations Committee also worked on a number of other issues over the summer. We responded to a veterinarian member's concern about the fact that rabies is not a required vaccination for horses in Maryland. We surveyed our member veterinarians for their views, and we have now expanded our survey to all equine veterinarians, regard-

less of their MHC membership status. Depending on the survey results, we will consider approaching the Maryland Veterinary Board about possible rule changes.

We also conducted a webinar for MHC members on how to secure state bond funds for capital projects at eligible equine facilities. The panelists were Senator Katie Fry Hester (Howard & Carroll Counties), Del. Michele N. Guyton (Baltimore County), and David R. Brinkley, the Secretary of Management and Budget. They explained the legislative and regulatory process for

to ask for bond funds, and they said that both the General Assembly and the Governor's office are more than happy to work with the horse industry on capital projects. Each of them also stressed, repeatedly, how important it is to get to know your state representatives.

Please don't hesitate to contact MHC if you need help initiating a bond bill or if you are not sure who your state representatives are.

Upcoming State Regulatory Initiatives

MHC will participate in two state-wide regulatory initiatives this fall. We are members of the 2022 Maryland Horse Census committee

and will be helping the Maryland Department of Agriculture design the questions and solicit responses. We will also be part of the Maryland Department of Agriculture's FY2022 Horse Outreach Workgroup (HOW). The goal of HOW is to generate best management practices for horse operations on issues such as pasture management, equine carcass composting, manure removal, and the like.

As you can see, there are a lot of legislative and regulatory issues at play this year. Please reach out to us if you are interested in participating, or if you have any questions



Horses Return to Laurel Park

In early August, Laurel Park welcomed horses in training back to the track after four-month resurfacing and renovations project. The renovations, carried out by track operator 1/ST, included a multi-million dollar investment in an all-new base and cushion for the main dirt track as well as a state-of-the-art turf course aeration strategy. 1/ST also renovated several training barns.

"We want to, first and foremost, thank all the horsemen and horsewomen for their patience during the reconstruction of Laurel Park dirt surface and their continued participation and support of our racing program," said Maryland Jockey Club (MJC) Acting President and General Manager Mike Rogers.

MJC also announced last month that starting in September, stalls at MJC venues will be reserved for horses that race consistently at MJC venues. In addition, "trainers seeking to enter a MJC-stabled horse at a non-MJC venue will be required to obtain approval from our Racing Secretary, Jillian Tullock," Rogers added. Approval will be granted on a case-by-case basis.

The fall meet at Laurel begins on Thursday, September 9.



Schaefer Wins in Michigan

The Schaefer family of Westminster won big this past month at the Traverse City Horse Shows in Michigan, taking top honors in the \$25,000 Platinum Performance USHJA International Hunter Derby. Samantha Schaefer piloted sister Madeline's horse In the Know, a 12-year-old Warmblood gelding, for the win.

Thirty-one horses were entered in the class and only 12 riders made it past the Classic round to move to the second round. Schaefer had more than one entry in the class, as did fellow Marylander Jacob Pope. Schaefer, and In

the Know scored a 174 in the first round, but first place in the first phase went to her second mount, Caristo, with a score of 182.

The top 12 riders returned for the Handy round, riding in reverse order of standings. Schaefer and In the Know were the fifth to enter the ring, and they scored an impressive 200. With a combined score of 374, Schaefer and In the Know moved into the top slot. Schaefer finished the day with a 366 on Caristo to end up in fifth as well.

Pope rode With Honors to a combined score of 364.5 to place sixth in the class.

The Maryland Horse Council received the following letter on July 19, 2021.

"My daughter competed at Loch Moy Farm in Adamstown, MD, last week and received a copy of the Equiery magazine. In the downtime I had a chance to read through the communication. I'm reaching out to give you and the state of Maryland some kudos. By supporting the horse industry, Maryland is bringing in revenue from out-of-staters like me. I live north of Pittsburgh, PA, and find myself 3 -5 times a year in Maryland with my daughter competing. We typically compete at Loch Moy or Waredaca but have also been to the Seneca Valley Pony Club shows at Bittersweet Field and always look for shows in Maryland that work with our schedule.

"As an example, besides our entry fee of about \$250 we had a hotel stay, we purchased almost \$100 in gas (thanks to big diesel truck), bought 2 meals at a local restaurant, and picked up incidentals like snacks and ice. An average weekend we spend \$750 in the state of Maryland. Please continue to let those in charge know the benefits of having an active horse community."

2022 MHIB Grants Application Open

MHIB is currently accepting applications for the 2022 Maryland Horse Industry Board Grant program. The grant program is funded by the Maryland Feed Fund, which collects \$6 from every ton of horse feed sold in Maryland. Since the Feed Fund was established in 2002, MHIB has awarded over \$500,000 in grants for nearly 400 projects throughout Maryland.

Catering to the Cats of Laurel Park



While Laurel Park was under renovation, horses in training moved to Pimlico Race Course and the Maryland State Fair Race Track at Timonium. The nearly 45 barn cats at Laurel did not, however, make the move. Ruth Stone, a track camera operator on race days who also works for trainer Hugh Mc-Mann, along with volunteer Lou Bowling Steinfort, stepped in to care for the cats by building a temporary sanctuary in one of Laurel's empty barns that they named Kitty City. "Normally the people at each barn will feed them and some took their cats with them but most stayed here during the renovations," said Stone.

When the track reopened in early August, Stone and Steinfort returned all the cats to their home barns and, on August 12, they finished breaking down Kitty City.

Stone has been caring for cats at Laurel for the past 12 years and explained that in 2009, the cat population at Laurel Park was at an all time high. She said there "were over 200 cats here, and we started a TNR [trap, neuter, release] program to manage them." Not all the cats were released back at the track, however. Some were adopted or fostered. "I took home four... and now have about 13!" Stone said with a laugh.

Steinfort, a local hunter judge and trainer, became involved in June of 2009 to help with the TNR program and has helped Stone monitor the cat population ever since. The program relies heavily on private donations and it is clearly working. As Stone said, "We haven't had a litter born here for at least five years."

Chanceland Farm Filly Wins Yearling Show

A Street Sense filly owned by Katharine M. Voss of Chanceland Farm was crowned Grand Champion at the 87th Annual Maryland Horse Breeders Association's Yearling Show, held August 1 at the Timonium Fairgrounds. The filly is out of Belterra, an Unbridled mare, and bred by the late Robert T. Manfuso.

The filly also won Class IV, which is for fillies foaled in Maryland by out of state sires. The yearling was shown by Chanceland's man-

ager Casey Randall and topped 87 yearlings for Grand Championship honors. This year's judge was Gary Contessa, who said, "We all know that on a horse, the engine is in the rear, and she's got like a 400 horsepower engine in that rear end." He added, "She was classy, she had her ears up, she had the shoulders that matched the engine, she just had it all in my opinion."

The Reserve Championship went to Hillwood Stable's homebred filly by Great Notion out of Dearie Be Good by Scrimshaw. This filly also won Class II, which is for fillies foaled in Maryland by Maryland sires.

Great Notion was named leading sire for the show and received the Northview Stallion Station Trophy.

All yearlings entered in the show are eligible for the \$40,000 premium award. This award is split annually, with \$20,000 going to the exhibitors of the four show contestants who earn

the most money as two-year-olds during 2022, and another \$20,000 going to the exhibitors of the four highest-earning three-year-old runners the following year.



O'Neil Wins Jumper Championship

McKenna O'Neil of White Hall rode Classico Z as part of the USHJA Zone 3 team that recently won the Gold Medal at the USHJA Team Championships, held at the Tryon International Equestrian Center Mill Spring, NC on July 10-27. Margaret Maher of Monkton served as one of the chefs d'equipe for the Zone 3 teams.

O'Neil was the only Maryland-resident on the Zone 3 team, as Trey Batts, Pilar Ojeda and Lilly Myers were all from North Carolina.

The Equiery recently conducted a survey asking readers which of the many Maryland parks they have ridden in. There are over 100 Maryland parks with equestrian trails, and we were delighted to see that every park on our list has been visited by at least one person. We also learned about two more parks in Maryland that offer equestrian trails.

Our full list of Maryland public equestrian trails is on page 21. Here we reveal our readers' top 10 most popular parks.

The Survey

We generated our list of 104 public parks from the Maryland Horse Industry Board's "Maryland Horse Trails" guide, which was last updated in 2014. To that list we added King's Landing Park in Calvert County and the Agricultural History Farm Park in Montgomery County based on survey input, bringing our master list of public equestrian trails in Maryland to 106 parks.

The majority of the people who responded to our survey were from Carroll County (16.8%), followed by Montgomery County (15.8%) and Harford County (9.9%). We also had seven respondents who are not Maryland residents but who nevertheless enjoy our trail system.

Additional Comments

We asked participants for additional comments about their trail riding experiences in Maryland public parks. Responses varied but many of them involved loose dogs and congestion with hikers and people on bikes. Many of these trails are multi-use trails. Our "Trail Etiquette and Safety Guidelines" are on page 24, and we hope they will help equestrians navigate the do's and don'ts of riding on multi-use trails.

Our survey also expressed surprise at how many equestrian trails we have. We hope this issue of *The Equiery* will help spread the word. More information on Maryland's trails and various trails-related links can be found on equiery.com.

Top 10 Parks for Trail Riding
#1 Fair Hill Natural Resources Management



Almost half of our survey respondents have ridden at Fair Hill, making it the top pick on our public trails list. Fair Hill offers 80-miles of trails on over 5,656 acres of preserved land in Cecil County.

The park is managed by the Maryland Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and offers camping sites, overnight stabling, rest rooms with showers, and electric hook up.

Fair Hill is also home to the Cecil County Fair, horse trials, horse shows, steeplechase races, and for the first time next month, the Maryland 5 Star at Fair Hill three-day event.

#2 Patapsco Valley State Park/McKeldin Area



The second most popular park was the McKeldin Area of Patapsco Valley State Park, in Carroll County. The McKeldin Area is where the main branch and south branch of the Pataspco River join

to create rapids along the south branch that can be seen from the Rapid Trail. The rocks in the McKeldin Falls are Baltimore Gneiss and they carbon date to over 1.1 billion years ago, some of the oldest rock outcroppings in our area.

#3 Morgan Run Natural Environment Area



Morgan Run, also in Carroll County, was the third most popular park in our survey. This park has 11 miles of trails over 1,400 acres, maintained by MHC-member association the Carroll County Equestrian

Council. Morgan Run is a trout catch-andrelease area, and some areas are restricted wetlands. Please check the park boards at the trail heads before heading out on the trails.

#4 Gunpowder Falls State Park/Graham Equestrian Center



With over 20 miles of trails to explore, this 18,000-acre Baltimore County section of the Gunpowder Falls park, run by Maryland DNR, is number four on our list.

Riders must check in at Graham Equestrian Center (which does not offer trail rides/rentals) in order to use this section of the park.

#5 Gunpowder Falls State Park/Sweet Air



The Sweet Air section of Gunpowder Falls State Park straddles the Little Gunpowder Falls between Harford and Baltimore counties. The Sweet Air area offers 18 miles of trails spread over

1,250 acres of natural terrain.

Horseback riding is allowed on all trails in the park except for the Cody Jean and Red Dot Trails.

#6 Rosaryville State Park



Rosaryville State Park in Prince George's County is ranked sixth on our list. The 982-acre park is managed by Maryland DNR and holds 10 miles of trails. Rosaryville is rich in Maryland his-

tory with structures dating back to the original Calvert family.

The park is also home to the Marlborough Horse Trials, hunter paces, fox chasing, and other activities.

spread over 3,700 acres with over 20 miles of trails. Little Bennett is one of the few parks in Maryland where you can go camping with your horse.

The trails at Little Bennett range from

open fields to wooded paths, taking visitors around a lake and past various historic sites. There are multiple trailer parking areas with access to various trails.

#8 Patuxent River State Park/Annapolis Rock Road



Annapolis Rock is on the Howard County side of the Patuxent River State Park. The entire Patuxent River State Park crosses between Howard and Montgomery counties and is 6,700 acres with

over 25 miles of trails. According to our survey participants, the Howard County section gets more use with 28 people saying they trail

ride there as opposed to 15 in the Montgomery County section.

Trail heads can be found from parking areas at Long Corner, Mullinix Mill, Route 94, Hipsley Mill, Howard Chapel and Route 97 road crossings over the river.

#9 Schooley Mill Park



Schooley Mill Park, run by Howard County Parks, is the smallest park to make our top 10 list with only five miles of trails over 192 acres. Despite its small size, over 25% of our survey respondents

reported riding there. The park offers a mix of woodland trails and meadow paths, and also has a small cross-country jump course.

Schooley Mill also has a sand arena and two smaller schooling rings. The park is home to several horse shows including those organized by *Equiery* advertiser Potomac Valley Dressage Association.

#10 Patapsco Valley State Park/Avalon Area

The Avalon Area of the Patapsco Valley State Park is located in Baltimore County and



rounds out our top 10 list. Maintained by Maryland DNR, the park has 20 miles of trails over 16,043 acres. This section of Patapsco links to Rockburn Branch Park in Howard County, which has an

additional 5 miles of trails to explore.

The Avalon area has picnic shelters, a visitor's center (currently closed for renovation) and access to the Orange Grove area of Patapsco.





Trail Etiquette & Safety Guidelines

by the Maryland Horse Council's Trails & Greenways Committee

Tips for Hikers, Cyclists & Equestrians

As temperatures in Maryland begin to cool off over the next several weeks, more of us will be spending time outside enjoying Maryland's extensive multi-use trail systems. With miles and miles to choose from in every county of the State, trail riding is a great way to see Maryland's diverse topography and ecosystems.

Before heading out on the trails, it is important to keep in mind safety for both you and your horse, as well as the other trail users you may encounter. Below is a brief guide to Trail Etiquette & Safety produced by the Maryland Horse Council's Trails & Greenways Committee.

General Guidelines & Safety Tips

Before you go out on the trails, familiarize yourself with your destination by checking out online maps, available facilities, and parking for cars and trailers. Make sure that your destination area is open. Make sure you know if you will be on public or private land. NEVER enter private land without the owner's permission, and ALWAYS stay off planted cropland. If you are going out alone, tell someone your planned route.

- Respect the Trails: Clean up litter (pack out what is packed in), protect the trail environment, e.g. do not remove things that belong on the trails or blaze new trails.
- Look and Listen: Become the eyes and ears of the trail system. Report problems, e.g. washed-out bridges or downed trees and debris, to the park's maintenance system.
- Maintain the Trails: Give back to the trails you use by getting involved with trail maintenance. See page 18 for a list of Maryland Horse Council member organizations that relate to trails and open space.
- Share the Trails: Cyclists yield to all other trail users and hikers yield to equestrians.
- Be Courteous: On crowded trails, proceed single file.
- Keep Things Moving: Slower traffic should keep to the right of the

trail; faster users pass on the left.

- Keep Things Clear: Do not pass on narrow bends. Pass only when you can clearly see the trail and traffic approaching from the opposite direction.
- No Surprises: When passing other trail users, provide adequate warning, and reduce speed.
- Watch Out: Animals on the trails may act unexpectedly. If you are unsure about approaching someone with a horse or dog, ask the handler/rider for guidance. If you are using trails on land where hunting is permitted, check the hunting season calendar maintained by the Department of Natural Resources.
- Watch Your Step: Tread gently when the trails are muddy; footprints, bicycle ruts, and hoofprints can damage the trails.
- Watch Your Volume: If you choose to wear a stereo/headphone set, make sure that the volume neither prevents you from hearing what is happening around you, nor disturbs the other trail users.
- Help Others: If you come upon an injured rider (horse or bicycle), get help immediately. If you come upon a riderless horse, do not approach the horse if you are uncomfortable with horses. Seek professional help. If you choose to approach the horse, speak softly to let it know you are there. Do not chase it. Approach it from the side.
- Lock Your Vehicles: Be sure to lock your tow vehicles and trailer to avoid possible thefts from parked vehicles while you are riding.

Additional Etiquette for Hikers/Joggers

- Always yield to equestrians. If you see a horse and rider, say "hello" in a calm, reassuring manner so the horse does not startle.
- If you wish to approach a horse, ask the rider for guidance. If you are with a child when you come upon a horse, hold the child's hand and stay toward the front (but not directly in front) of the horse. Do not approach a horse from behind. Most equestrians will gladly let you and your children pet their horses, but always ask permission first.
- When hiking/jogging with a dog, obey posted leash regulations. Keep a short leash on your dog when passing (or being passed by) horses, cycontinued...

clists, or other pedestrians. Remember that other users may be frightened by your dog, and be unsure how to pass safely.

Additional Etiquette for Cyclists

- · Approach and pass other trail users with care. You are obligated to yield to all other trail users.
- When approaching from behind, announce yourself (and the number of other cyclists in your group) well in advance so that you do not startle other trail users, especially horses.
- Reduce speed in order to pass safely. Pass horses far to the left to avoid unintentional contact.
- Red ribbons in a horse's tail are an indication that it may kick if approached too closely from behind.
- · Should your approach cause a horse to spook or become frightened, be considerate and stop. Wait for the rider to say that it is okay to pass.
- Stay on trails approved for bicycles.
- Obey posted speed limits and use common sense in crowded areas.
- Approach blind curves with caution and assume someone is coming in the opposite direction.
- Use the appropriate hand signals for turning, stopping, etc.

Additional Etiquette for Equestrians

• Be sure your horse has the temperament and training for riding on congested public trails. Busy multi-use trails are not the proper place for

schooling green horses.

- Advise other trail users of your horse's temperament, e.g. a horse with a tendency to kick should always wear a red ribbon in the tail, or a stallion should wear a yellow ribbon. Young horses often wear green ribbons. Assume that not everyone will know what these ribbons mean, so be prepared to explain or take the necessary precautions to avoid trouble.
- · Obey posted speed/gait limits, and use common sense in crowded areas (cantering/galloping on crowded trails endangers everyone).
- Remove your horse from the trail if you begin experiencing behavior problems.
- Stay on equestrian approved trails.
- As a courtesy to others in your group, use appropriate hand signals for turning, slowing, etc. and give verbal warnings for dangers on the trail (e.g., holes, low branches, etc.)
- · Remember that other trail users may not be familiar with horses or their reactions to new experiences. Your horse may be another trail user's introduction to horses and what you do is a reflection on the local horse community. Cheerfully answer questions about your horse. You are an ambassador for the entire equestrian community.
- If you trailer to a location, do not clean out your trailer in the parking area. Pack your manure out in your trailer.
- On multiple-use trails, step off the trail (if possible) if your horse needs to relieve himself, or kick the droppings off the trail.
