



Cap Challenge Moves to Ohio

Last month we reported that this year's Capital Challenge Horse Show was set to run at the Prince George's Equestrian Center in Upper Marlboro as scheduled. Sadly, we learned on August 17 that due to changes with the county's parks department regulations, the Capital Challenge management team is moving the show to the World Equestrian Center in Wilmington, OH on September 25 - October 4, pending US Equestrain approval.

A press release issued by Capital Challenge stated, "Due to the Prince George's County Parks Department's tightened regulations surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic and its decision to decrease the number of horses allowed at the facility, management made the difficult decision to move the horse show."

"We have been grateful for the Roberts family's continued support of Capital Challenge," said Capital Challenge show manager Oliver Kennedy of the owners and operators of the World Equestrian Center. "When things were looking difficult recently, they stepped right up to the plate. This was not an easy decision to make, but it will be a way to still have the Capital Challenge Horse Show that everyone knows and loves, in a format and venue that will provide the best experience possible."

The World Equestrian Center has been the presenting sponsor of Capital Challenge Horse Show since 2016, and now the well-regarded, state-of-the-art equestrian sports venue will also provide a safe, top-of-the-line facility for the popular year-end horse show.

Currently, Capital Challenge plans to host all slated classes including the North American League Jumper Finals and Medium Junior/Amateur-Owner Jumpers. A revised schedule and prize list is available online.

Dr. Sobota Named to MHIB

Dr. Justin Sobota, owner of South Mountain Equine (Middletown), has been appointed by Governor Larry Hogan to represent Licensed Veterinarians on the Maryland Horse Industry Board. Nation Media Awards \$5,400 in Diversity Scholarships

This past July, Nation Media (Eventing Nation, Jumper Nation and Horse Nation) announced the winners of its 1st Annual \$5,000 Diversity Scholarship. The mission of the program is to "call for, en-

courage, elevate and give a platform to minority voices in a space where they are underrepresented" according to Nation Media's July 31 post on eventingnation.com.

Eventing Nation's Editor-in-Chief, Leslie Wylie, recently stated, "The Diversity Scholarship was really a spontaneous, seat-of-the-pants endeavor. We were so excited to see the equestrian world engage with the Black Lives Matter movement, with some really progressive discourse emerging about how to make the horse world a more diverse and inclusive space."

Wylie explained that she was a panelist on the 2019 Tom Bass Seminar at Tryon International Equestrian Center, which was the first ever seminar dedicated to the subject of diversity in equestrian sports. She said that two things really jumped out to her at the seminar. "First, and this seems obvious but I think sometimes it gets lost in the shuffle, is the importance of just shutting up and listening to what minority voices have to say," she said. Wylie feels, "we need to stop talking over minority voices and give them the microphone instead."

Secondly, Wylie realized that although conversations were a great place to start, these words were "only as good as our ability to take them out into the world and make them actionable." Thus, Nation Media started the idea of a Diversity Scholarship and first announced the "1st Annual \$1,000 Diversity Scholarship" on June 26.

Support for the scholarship took off and more and more people began pledging funds to the scholarship. With the help of generous donations from Stable View, Katherine Coleman and Hannah Hawkins, Nation Media was able to offer \$5400 worth of scholarship funds for 2020.

This year's scholarship program received 27 submissions representing a broad spectrum of gender, racial, ethnic, sexual and class identities. The program's scholarship winners cross many equine disciplines as well, including eventing, hunters, jumpers, dressage, polo and western. "In lieu of declaring a winner we have expanded the fund to award each applicant \$200," Nation Media stated on July 31.

Since announcing this year's winners, Eventing Nation has begun publishing essays from each rider every day on their website. In addition, at the end of each essay, EN posts a "Get Involved" section with resources and ideas for readers to be able to take action. The online essays keep the conversation going and help people take action. "Our response from readers to the essays has been really encouraging," Wylie said, "Just comment after comment of positivity and encouragement for the essay writers."

Nation Media intends to continue the schol-

arship on an annual basis.

Lasix-free Study

A Lasix-free study on two-year-old race-horses in Maryland kicked off on August 7 at Laurel Park. The planned study was approved by the Maryland Equine Safety, Health and Welfare Advisory Committee, which falls under the Maryland Racing Commission. The study includes post race video endoscopies of all starters in 2-year-old races.

Through a press release, the Maryland Jockey Club stated that under an emergency regulation approved on August 2, all 2-year-old races through December 31 will be run Lasix-free with a 48-hour cut-off of the therapeutic medication. Private veterinarians who practice at Laurel will perform the endoscopies. Information forms for each horse will gather data to be transferred to an online database. MRC will maintain all records and only a horse's owner and trainer will be given the results to maintain anonymity.

The study is part of a broader agreement between the Maryland Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association and The Stronach Group for a Lasix-free pilot program that will run through 2023 for 2-year-old races and grades stakes only. Graded stakes races for 2020 are not part of the pilot program.

WIHS Joins List of Canceled 2020 Shows

On August 14, the Board of Directors and show management team for the Washington International Horse Show, presented by Mars Equestrian, announced the cancellation of the 2020 WIHS. Earlier this summer, on July 23, WIHS's board had announced the show would move to Tampa, Florida, due to the continued closure of the Capital One Arena.

In its newest press release, WIHS stated that because "multiple issues have evolved resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, WIHS found it impossible to successfully host the Longines FEI Jumping World CupTM Washington for 2020."

WIHS has also moved its WIHS Equitation Finals and WIHS Pony Equitation Finals, as well as the WIHS Children's and Adult Hunter and Jumper Finals, to Tryon International Equestrian Center in North Carolina. These classes will be held October 20-25.

State Fair Canceled, Some Horse Shows Go On

On August 5, Maryland State Fair officials canceled this year's fair due to the COVID-19 pandemic. "There will be no rides, no racing, no public building, no commercial building, no indoor entries, no farm and garden entries," stated general manager Andy Cashman. "The only thing we're going to have at this year's fair will be the junior and open livestock shows... [and] no public will be invited." In addition, those livestock shows held will be open to instate participants only.

The fair was originally set to run from August 27 to September 7.

Kudos...

Kudos to Alexis Kinney and Abigail Grove on being named to the Interscholastic Equestrian Association's Youth Board for the 2020-2021 season. Kinney is a junior from Hollywood and rides hunters out of A Moment in Time. Grove is a sophomore from Cumberland. She rides dressage out of Mystic Meadows Farm.

IHSA Adds Ranch Riding

The Intercollegiate Horse Shows Association (IHSA) leadership team announced on July 29 the addition of Ranch Riding classes to its Western divisions. The new class includes individual performance of an approved pattern that emulates maneuvers commonly used in ranch work such as gait extensions and turnarounds. The new class is being offered to IHSA Western Level II members.

It was the late 1960s when a teenaged Bobby Lillis first stepped foot on a racetrack. "I remember watching those horses coming out of the paddock and seeing the beautiful colors of the jockeys' silks and the majestic, shiney horses and my jaw dropped," he reminisced. "I was just in awe."That was at the then Hazel Park in Michigan, just a few years before Lillis started an impressively long career within the racing industry.

Race Riding

When Lillis was just 15 years old, he and his parents headed to Detroit Race Course to meet with some trainers and jockeys. "Someone said that Bob Holthus was looking for a hot walker so we met with him and next thing I know, I'm living in a tack room at the track," Lillis said. At the time, Lillis already had dreams of riding but had never sat on a horse.

"I learned to be a groom and then when I was 18 I went to Sugar Hill Farm in Ocala [Florida] to work for Sherman Armstrong," said. Armstrong he was the leading jockey two-year-olds at the time and declared to Lillis that he would teach him to ride. "We standing were there looking at a field of yearlings and he pointed at them and said, 'I'm going to teach you to ride them," Lillis remembered with a chuckle. "I kept telling him I've never ridden before and he just said, 'you'll fall off so many

times you'll learn to stay on."

Under Armstrong's guidance, Lillis learned to start yearlings and eventually became an exercise rider for trainer Henry Shadowens. "I


remember Sherman telling me not to rush into race riding and that I'd know when I was ready to ride in a race," Lillis added.

By the fall of 1974, Lillis was sitting on a horse in the starting gate in his first race as a jockey. He was back at Hazel Park in a 6-fur-

long race and finished third. "What I remember most about that first race was how much my knees wanted to buckle when I was done. I was exhausted but loved it!"

The following year he broke his maiden on a horse named Kitty's Special. That was March 9, 1975, at Suffolk Downs in Massa-Lillis was living the

life of the traveling jockey, wintering in Florida and traveling up the coast to Boston, stopping along the way at various tracks during various seasons. In 1976, he had a jockey's license at 10 different tracks on the East Coast.



Maryland's Appeal

In 1975, Lillis met his wife Ruthanne at Monmouth Park in New Jersey and in the spring of 1976 they decided to settle in Maryland. Why you might ask? Because between Pimlico, Timonium, Laurel Park and Bowie Race Course,

> Maryland offered year-round racing. "I knew here in Maryland I could just stay put," he said.

Lillis describes his career as a jockey as "average" but said, "I was able to put two kids through college. I also exercised [racehorses] in the mornings and was a parking attendant." Being multi-talented and willing to work is what has kept Lillis in the industry for so long. When he had a bad fall that forced him to retire from race riding, "I had a chip in my hand and just

couldn't hold a galloping horse," he had other options to pursue within the industry.

Bobby Lillis' first win as a jockey came aboard

Kitty's Special at Suffolk Downs in 1975.

At the same time as his injury, the idea of casinos in Maryland was just getting started.

"We thought this would destroy racing because at first, no slots revenue was going to racing," he explained. So Lillis began writing weekly to local papers in opposition to the casinos. "I became a bit political by writing letters to the [Baltimore] Sun, BloodHorse and the Washing-

ton Post," he said. "Then slots got tagged with racing incentives for purses and everything changed."

It was Lillis' passion for the sport he loved that impressed Richard Meyer, then President of the Maryland Horsemen's Assistance Fund Board of Directors.

Backstretch Advocate

In August 1998, Meyer approached Lillis asking if he wanted to work for MHAF. "I thought I had hit the lottery!" Lillis said with a laugh. "It was a Monday through Friday job so I didn't have to work weekends anymore!" However, it was working and advocating for backstretch workers that really drew Lillis to the job. "I lived and worked that lifestyle and have a soft spot for backstretch workers."

Twenty-one years later, Lillis announced his retirement as MHAF's Executive Director earlier this summer. However, he's not ready for retirement! "I'm staying on 'til the end of the year to help them transition to someone new," he reported. "After 50 plus years of being in the industry, I couldn't just walk away completely!"

During his time with MHAF, Lillis also took time out of his schedule to advocate for the sport as a whole, educating the general public through the Sunrise Tours during Preakness Week at Pimlico and in the Horseland tent at the Maryland State Fair.

"Fran Burns approached me one year to fill a spot when Donny Miller, Sr., had to pull out due to an injury," Lillis said of his first Sunrise Tour experience. "She's the one that suggested instead of being a tour guide, I have a station to talk about what it's like to be a jockey."

In true Lillis fashion, he went above and beyond with his tour stop. "I was able to get some extra silks, goggles and saddles and such to pass around to the kids and such," he said. "The people who came [to Pimlico] got a chance to actually touch the equipment and see how light the saddles are and try on some goggles." Burns loved it and Lillis has had a tour stop ever since. "After that first year, I started asking the jock-

eys to save me the goggles they weren't using any longer and I would give those out to the kids who came on the tours."

"The general public has a different perspective of what the industry really is like," he added. "These tours are a good opportunity to change that perspective."

At Horseland, Lillis took the Sunrise Tour stop idea to a whole new level by setting up a booth complete with an exerciser and silks and such kids could actually try on. "It's a big hit with the kids and a great photo op for the parents!"

Honoring a Hero

Over the past 50 years, Lillis has given his all to the racing industry, with the majority of this effort benefitting Maryland's backstretch workers and the overall image of the industry. Lillis has been recognized for his efforts over the years with a variety of awards.

Most recently, Lillis was awarded the Godolphin Thoroughbred Industry Community Award in 2019. That vear he also earned a Touch of Class Award through the Maryland Horse Industry Board.

Lillis has also earned the Maryland Racing Media Association President's Award, the Maryland Jockey Club Circle of Excellence Award, the MTHA Outstanding Service to Maryland Horse-

But it is not the awards that drive Lillis. It is sharing his own experiences and love of the sport. "I have to say, and people need to know, that horse racing here in Maryland has endless opportunities. So many countless opportunities to carve out a lifetime career."





The COVID Triple Crown

The Preakness Stakes is by far the biggest racing day on the Maryland schedule each year. It is the day when the world descends on Maryland to see if that year's Kentucky Derby winner will make it one step closer to becoming part of Triple Crown history. The week leading up to the Preakness is always an exciting one with racing fans getting a chance to look behind the scenes of Pimlico through Sunrise Tours, industry leaders highlighting excellence through the Alibi Breakfast awards and of course, two days packed full of stakes races and fun on Black-Eyed Susan and Preakness Day.

But this year is different, as the COVID-19 pandemic has thrown one giant wrench into the Triple Crown.

The "Triple Crown"

As the world came to a halt this spring, the Maryland Jockey Club made the decision to move the Preakness Stakes to October 3 this year. Traditionally, the Preakness is the second race in the Triple Crown and is run mid-May. The Belmont Stakes, normally the last race in the series, decided to run on June 20, though the race distance was shortened, and the Kentucky Derby moved to September 5.

Thus, the 2020 Triple Crown will be run in a completely different order: Belmont, Derby and then Preak-

ness. The change certainly breaks with tradition and brings up a whole host of questions, uncertainties and excitement related to what the 2020 Triple Crown will actually look like.

"The Triple Crown is completely upside down this year," trainer Graham Motion stated. "With two races in the fall, you are going to see a deeper field of more accomplished horses." Motion, who won the 2011 Kentucky Derby with Animal Kingdom, pointed out that most horses are barely three-years-old when the Derby typically runs. "When we won with Animal Kingdom, he had never run on dirt before. Now, you have more developed horses that have more experience running," he said.

Motion predicts that the fall races will create more competitive fields at both the Derby and Preakness. He also pointed out the longer time between each race gives horses more time



to recover and also more time to train between races. All these changes have Motion stating, "There will need to be an astrix next to this year because of how different the schedule is. It will be interesting to watch it all play out."

Fall Stakes Schedule

One positive to the Preakness move is that the various Preakness Week stakes races are moving to the fall as well. Trainer Katy Voss stated, "There are loads of opportunities for

the stakes horses starting in September." Voss is currently looking to run a few horses in the new Preakness Week stakes races. Motion agrees stating, "it's a bonus to have so many stakes races to point to this fall."

Trainer Phil Shoenthal stated that the Preakness move does not have a huge effect on most mid-Atlantic trainers adding, "for every person who was unhappy with the change you have someone who is

happy [about it]." Shoenthal pointed out that some trainers had horses ready to run in May

while others have horses that have benefited from having more time to develop for fall stakes.

Shoenthal's biggest concern about stakes races in general for 2020 is funding the purses. "We as horseman really need to have a conversation about the purses," he said pointing out that a large amount of purse money comes from slots. "The casinos were closed for so long and this has had a big impact on how much money is available. We need to figure out the best way to utilize what money there is."

Voss pointed out that the industry has lost around 20% of the year's purse funds due to the lack of revenue from slots.

Racing During COVID

As many in the horse industry have found, trying to run some sort of normal operations during this pandemic is basically impossible. But as others in Maryland's equine industry have also done, Maryland's racing industry has found ways to adapt and keep on running.

Throughout the pandemic, the Maryland Jockey Club has issued "COVID-19 Quarantine Updates" with various changes to procedures in order to continue with live racing. Currently, live Thoroughbred racing is at Laurel Park only, with the summer Timonium meet being moved to Laurel Park and a fall Preakness meeting to be run at Pimlico still in the works.

MJC has limited who can come onto the track and how long individuals can remain in various areas such as the paddock, stables and along the rail. Temperature check points are also being used and face masks are mandatory with jockeys pulling them down once in the starting gate. "We are being a lot more cautious than many other people in the state," Voss stated. But this cautiousness is what is keeping Maryland's racing industry open for business.

"We were so fortunate so far but [COV-ID-19] isn't over yet and the most important

thing is for all of us not to get careless," Voss added.

Shoenthal said CO-VID-19 has only slightly changed his schedule this year and he has been shipping horses to other tracks. "Some of these tracks you have to just drop the horse off with a trainer there so there are added costs," he said, adding, "If you have enough will, there is a way and you just do what you have to do to get it done."

Motion however stated that some of these restrictions have made him think twice about where he ships his horses. "Most

tracks are not letting you bring your own team so you have to really trust who is there working your horses. That's hard for a trainer to do and

is not a risk I want to take unless needed," he said. At the time of this interview, Motion was based at Saratoga in New York and added, "I

also don't want to put my staff or myself at risk of [getting] COV-ID by traveling a lot right now."

The Jockey Shuffle

In order to prevent the spread of COVID-19, MJC, along with many tracks in the U.S., have put a ban on jockey travel. In essence, jockeys must choose which track they want to be based at and cannot switch tracks until they self-quarantine for 14 days or provide a negative COVID-19 test result.

These restrictions have greatly greatly affected the dynamics of races in terms of who gets to ride who as many trainers have to pick jockeys from the tracks they are running out of instead

of those they normally hire. "You are really seeing this change the smaller tracks and affects who you can use," Motion said.

Voss stated that she only has a few horses running at the time of this interview and was "staying local" and that her main jockey had chosen to stay in Maryland as well. "It is giving our local guys more [ride] opportunities, which

has been great," she added.

Shoenthal added that the jockeys he typically uses to exercise his horses in Maryland normally go to Charles Town and Delaware to race in the afternoons and evenings, but that has all changed this year. "I have a horse pointed at the Charlestown Oaks and we must use Charlestown jockeys. They have made the right decision and it's a huge opportunity for those guys," he stated.

He also wonders if the jockey rule will change for the Preakness. "If Tiz the Law wins the Derby, he's coming to Maryland so who then gets to ride him?" he asked. "My personal opinion is we need to keep to

Maryland jockeys and keep us all safe." Tiz the Law won the Belmont this year and is currently pointed at the Kentucky Derby. He has yet to be defeated in 2020.

Maryland native and jockey Forest Boyce de-

cided to move to Colonial Downs once racing started back up. "At the time, Maryland was only racing two days a week and a lot of my business was shipping here," she said. During a normal summer, Boyce would be riding at Maryland, Delaware and Virginia tracks. She added that being confined to one track makes it hard to follow her good horses around which, "is quite frustrating but [I] know everyone is in the same boat."

Overall, Boyce reported that she is very impressed with everything the different tracks are doing to keep people safe from COVID-19. "They take our temps at various check points throughout the day and monitor everyone closely," she said. "In a lot of ways we are much better protected than a lot of other industries out there right now."

Unfortunately, even with the best procedures in place, COVID-19 struck again as shortly after this interview was done, Colonial Downs was shut down when a jockey tested positive for COVID-19.

An Uncertain Future

Like many other industries across the country, the future during COVID-19 is very uncertain. Until a working vaccine is developed and bet-

ter treatments are found, COVID-19 continues to wreak havoc on industries. Luckily, with the help of innovative people, Maryland's racing industry is prevailing.

Voss wonders what the fall Thoroughbred sales will look like. "Like a lot of other industries, many are just leaving the business."

Shoenthal is hoping that as time goes on, MJC will have found ways to allow greater access to owners and fans. "Without owners there is no sport," he said. "When you take the live

experience out of it [for owners], I worry a lot will start pulling out." He also worries about how the industry will survive without the fans.

There is one thing however we can bet on... whether watching from our couches at home, at an off-track betting site, or even streaming on our phones, this year's Preakness Stakes on October 3 is certainly a historical moment in Triple Crown history to look forward to!

The 145th Preakness Stakes: A Jewel to Remember



The 145th Preakness Stakes will be run at the historic Pimlico Race Course on October 3, 2020. With the Triple Crown having been shaken up by COVID-19 this year, the Preakness will be the last race of the series instead of the middle jewel. All eyes will be on Belmont Stakes winner Tiz the Law as he runs in the Kentucky

Derby on September 5.

In the Belmont Stakes on June 20, jockey Manny Franco took the lead around the final turn and pushed Tiz the Law to win by nearly four lengths. Trained by Barclay Tagg for owners Sackatoga Stable LLC, the bay gelding by Constitution and out of the Tiznow mare Tizfiz is looking good heading into the Derby after a runaway win of the Travers Stakes in August. He's racked up \$2.02 million in just five stakes wins and has only lost once in six career starts.

MARYLAND WILL MISS...

Paul Hurston Cohen, owner of Associations Underwriters Insurance, died on May 20. He was 62. Cohen's agency provided equine insurance for many years. He was a dedicated supporter of the Maryland horse industry, participating in and contributing his expertise to many industry educational programs.

Douglas Steven Curtis of Sykesville died on May 24 of cancer. He was 65. Born in Schenectady, New York, Curtis was the devoted husband of Marjorie Davis. They were married for 33 years. Curtis was a lawyer and ran his own practice.

Tommy Lee Wilson

(provided by Debbie Palmisano)

Tommy Lee Wilson passed away on July 1 at the Gilcrest Hospice in Howard County. He was 81 years old. Tommy lived in Maryland his whole life. Tommy was the 1973 Maryland State Appoloosa Reining Champion and was a lifetime member of the Maryland State Quarter Horse Association.

In 1959, he began working for the U.S. Postal Service in Montgomery County and was a mail carrier for almost 40 years.

Tommy had a 50-year friendship with Mike Palmisano and trained horses for decades

out of Mike's farm, Easy Does It, in New Windsor. He had a way with horses that the Palmisanos trusted.

Tommy found helping educate horses and their owners very rewarding. He was best known for being able to teach any horse to walk on a trailer.

Tommy was not above learning either, as he went to the **Tommy Lee Wilson**

Maryland Horse World Expo the first year Clinton Anderson was there. Tommy talked to Clinton for hours, bought his training videos and returned to a young black QH colt that was having issues and completed his training using methods he learned from Anderson.

Tommy had the nickname the 7-11 Cowboy because he would start his mornings at 7-11 with a coffee and a paper. Sitting in his "famous" Black Dodge Truck, he would read the paper, drink his coffee and tell stories to anyone who stopped to listen. Tommy had the funniest stories and they were all true. He was one of a kind. He was a true friend.

Paul Joseph Goodness of Round Hill, Virginia died on July 21. He was 62 years old. Goodness was born in Babylon, New York and in 1973 began his career shoeing horses for his family's business, Gemini Farms in Pennsylvania. In 1976, he attended New York's Eastern States Farrier School and was accepted into the farrier internship program at the University of Pennsylvania School of Veterinary Medicine at New Bolton in 1981.

After completing the internship program, he moved his family to Virginia where he began developing a very successful sport horse and corrective shoeing practice. In 1990, Goodness and a partner founded Forging Ahead, the area's first group-farrier practice and referral therapeutic farrier clinic. Goodness was a Certified Journeyman Farrier with the American Farrier's Association and served as the official farrier for the U.S. Equestrian Team between 1992 and 1996. He completed his tenure with the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta, Georgia.

In 2016, Goodness became the in-house Chief of Farrier Services at the Virginia Polytechnic University's Equine Medical Center in Leesburg, Virginia.

Dale W. Massey of Berlin died on July 23

at the age of 91. He was the husband of Connie Gardner Massey, celebrating 68 years of marriage this year. In 1945, Dale Massey graduated Wicomico High School and enlisted in the U.S. Army, serving for two years.

As a young adult, Massey helped run his family's Massey Farm, where they raised beef cattle and Standardbred horses. Massey came from a horse-oriented family. His uncle Roger Whittington was the famed Thoroughbred War Admiral's

groom. Massey himself grew up attending Standardbred races regularly all over the East Coast.

He opened his own public stable in 1954 and became a successful driver, trainer and breeder. He spent several years as the leading U.D.R. Driver at Ocean Downs. He was proud of his homebreds, many of which earned Maryland State championship honors. Massey campaigned horses at tracks all over the U.S. and also internationally in England, France and Germany.

He was the director of the U.S. Trotting Association for 15 years, serving horsemen in Maryland, Delaware and Virginia and also




