






From the President

She was a recipient of the first annual Nations Media \$5,000 Diversity Scholarship, which was established to "encourage, elevate, and immediately give a platform to minority voices" in equestrian sports. In August 2020, she wrote an article for Eventing Nation titled "Exposure, Opportunity, Perception and Reception." Dawn has a

Happy 30th to The Equiery

I began to get nostalgic as the 30th anniversary issue of *The Equiery* neared, since I have been at *The Equiery* since August 1992, when founding publisher Crystal Brumme Pickett took a chance and hired me at the suggestion of two advertisers. For over 28 years, my life has revolved around the publication schedule of this magazine. One dear friend even planned her wedding around the production schedule. Over the years, there have been so many things that have had an impact on me that they remain unforgettable; the grand horse shows, the local schooling shows, movie premieres, Cavalia, the stallions, the foals, and the extraordinary people who have come into my life. As we started scanning covers and going through issues, so many memories returned.

With over 330 issues behind me, it would be easy for everything to be a blur, but one ad stands out among the thousands I have shepherded through the issues—the ad we created for Joe Carter, which ran in August,

1995. A group of Mr. Carter's friends got together to create this ad for Joe because he was dying of cancer and they wanted to let him know how much he meant to them. Sadly, Joe died before the issue came out, but we were told he had been shown the proof of the ad in his hospital bed and was deeply touched by his friends' devotion. I still can't think of or look at this ad without crying. We had so hoped that he would live to see it in print. The horse community is filled with so many people who remain relatively unknown, who work long hours for little pay or reward, because they love it so much. Joe adored his horses and racing. He would never win the Kentucky Derby, but that didn't take away from the joy of standing in the winner's circle with one of his horses. It's been 25 years since he died. I hope his friends still think of him occasionally, because whenever I do, I cry, and I never met him, but he had that much of an impact on me.

Working at *The Equiery* has taught me that, like every job in the horse industry, this isn't a job where you go home at the end of the day to your life, leaving work behind. So many of our clients have become friends. I have cheered for them and their successes, and comforted them during the difficult times. We've shared their joy at marriages and births, and mourned with them over divorce and death. We've cried with them when they've lost a beloved pet or their heart horse. For many, we've watched their children grow up. *The Equiery* started as a way for people to find information about the horse community, but it has become so much more. *The Equiery* wants our clients to succeed, because we aren't successful if they are not successful. Although we have grown well beyond being the

portable bulletin board for information, the core function has remained the same - to give people the information they need. By being a central source, it is so much easier to see how large and diverse the horse community really is, and over the years, *The Equiery* has played, and continues to play, an important part.

Joining forces with the Maryland Horse Council has only strengthened our ability to speak for the horse community. Working with the Maryland Horse Industry Board, we help the horse industry grow by bringing in newcomers and welcoming them to the world of horses.



Crystal Brumme Pickett's original vision was for *The Equiery* to be a place where an international trainer or competitor, as well as the pleasure horse owner, could find the goods and services they needed, as could the person looking to start taking lessons. Going forward, I see *The Equiery* continuing its mission, expanding its opportunities, and helping to grow the horse community. Here's to 30 more years!





Leonidas A Wins Potomac Pace

On November 15, 15-1 longshot Leonidas A took the win in the fifth running of the \$100,000 Potomac Pace Invitational at Rosecroft. The 5-year-old Australian-bred arrived in the U.S. this past July after being purchased by Steve Finklestein's Jesmeral Stable. Driven by Austin Siegelman and trained by Sheena McElhiney, Leonidas A set a lifetime mark of 1:48 and won his 13th race of the year.

Leonidas A stayed back at the start and then Siegelman moved him to the inside rail as the field past the grandstand. In the backstretch, Siegelman moved Leonidas A off the rail and just behind Bettor's Wish but as they neared the wire, Leonidas A charged to the front, winning by a length.

The favorite, Bettor's Wish, finished second while World of Secrets came in third.

Tent Collapses at Fairgrounds

On November 2, the Baltimore County Fire Department posted on Twitter that high winds caused at least one tent to collapse on several horses at the Maryland State Fairgrounds in Timonium. All horses were removed safely and one person was transported to a hospital with minor injuries.

Lisbon Horse Parade Goes Virtural

While there will not be a physical horse parade in Lisbon in 2020, the Great Farmers Feed the Hungry Christmas Parade will happen, virtually. Participants are invited to get creative, dress their horses, decorate their tractors, and make a video of what they would have done in front of the reviewing stand.

Participants will upload their 30 second videos to the Parade by December 12 and the videos will be compiled and premiered on New Year's Eve. For complete details, visit the parade's website at lisbonchristmashorseparade.org.

Sam Schaefer Wins Hunter Classic

Samantha Schaefer (Westminster) topped the \$50,000 National Horse Show Hunter Classic at this year's 137th National Horse Show on October 30. Riding In The Know, owned by Schaefer and her younger sister Madeline, the elder Schaefer sister bested 21 combinations for the win in the three-phase competition.

In the first test, a 3'6" course, Schaefer scored

an 87.12 to sit in second place. The top six pairs continued onto the second test over a 3'9" course. Schaefer's score of 87 pushed her into the lead where she remained after the top three competed over a 4' course.

In addition to the Classic win, Schaefer earned the Hunter Classic Rider Award with a \$5,000 cash prize provided by Audi of Lexington and Samuel A. Boone. She also was named the Meralex Farm Grand Champion Professional Hunter Rider after winning a number of classes at this year's National Horse Show.

Sagamore's Plank Leaves Racing

In early November, Kevin Plank announced that he is shutting down Sagamore Racing and will no longer be breeding and running horses out of the historic Sagamore Farm. He purchased the farm in 2007 and made several major renovations before establishing Sagamore

Racing. Plank does intend to keep the farm where he plans now to grow corn and rye for Sagamore Spirit.

Plank told BloodHorse, "I love this farm and am so proud of what we've built with Sagamore Racing, including helping to reenergize racing in Maryland and experience success on the track." He added, "The farm will remain in my family, but after 14 years it is time to use this beautiful piece of property in a new way. It will remain an asset to the community, but the primary purpose of our next chapter will focus on growing corn and rye to support

all we are doing with Sagamore Spirit and our award-winning rye whiskey."

Sagamore Racing saw its last runner Global Campaign (Curlin x Globe Trot, A.P. Indy) finish third in the Longines Breeders Cup Classic on November 7. Bred by WinStar Farm LLC in Kentucky, the 2016 colt is co-owned by Sagamore Farm LLC and WinStar Farm LLC, and currently has netted over a \$1,000,000 in winnings.

The Classic also marked the last race for Global Campaign as he is set to stand at stud at Win-Star Farm in Kentucky for the 2021 breeding season.

BloodHorse reported that Plank has been selling off horses in recent years and plans to have the farm fully transitioned by the end of this year. A small number of retired horses will remain on the farm to symbolize the history of Sagamore.

Mackenzie Hicks Finishes First 50-Miler

Thirteen-year-old Mackenzie Hicks of New Windsor completed her first 50-mile endurance ride on October 24 in

Fort Valley, VA. The Fort Valley endurance ride, which is held in the Massanutten Mountains, is a challenging and technical ride that consists of rocky single lane trails, old roadbeds, open fields and forest roads. The ride also includes several climbs to the top of the Massanutten range.

For the ride, Hicks rode Rackin' Randy, a nine-year-old gaited Spotted Saddle Horse. This was also his first 50-mile endurance ride.

Hicks rode along with seasoned endurance rider Angela Kemerer, who has mentored her since she entered the sport of distance riding in 2018. Competitors had twelve hours to complete the course. Hicks and Kemerer started the ride at 7:30 AM and crossed the finish line shortly before 7:00 PM.

The Joe Kelly Unsung Hero Award is presented annually by the Board of Directors of the Maryland Million Ltd. to honor the memory of Joe Kelly and celebrate important characteristics that are valuable but often unrewarded. The award recognizes honesty, hard work and humility – qualities that serve as inspiration to others.

"Being chosen a recipient of this award really gives encouragement [to] what we're doing at City Ranch, [showing] that we're valued in the industry and that the industry thinks what we're doing is significant," Dahn said. "To be recognized for that, from your colleagues, says an awful lot about what they think of you."

One of the highlights of the regional competition is the annual presentation of the Laura

Pickett Trophy for Excellence in Horsemanship, which was donated to WIHS by Vicki Lowell in memory of the beloved equestrian and trainer, Laura Pickett.

Pickett lost her fight against breast cancer when she was just 52 years old. This trophy honors her contributions to the sport and the legacy she has left behind. WIHS posted recently in a press release about the trophy, "She inspired

enthusiasm for life, in addition to good horsemanship." The trophy is awarded to an up and coming rider who best exhibits these same qualities.

This year's winner is Kayla Wolfe of Burke, VA. The 17-year-old has been a member of the WIHS Junior Committee for four years and has also competed at WIHS, finishing in the ribbons in the 2016 WIHS Children's Hunter



Yes, 30 years ago in December 1990, the very first *Equiery* landed in tack and feed stores, being hand delivered by co-founders Crystal Brumme Pickett and Mercedes Clemens (pictured).

Over the past 11 months, *The Equiery* has been sharing covers from every year bringing us to this issue, the 350th edition of *The Equiery*! On the December 2020 cover, you will see our readers' favorite covers from each year, votes counted from Facebook likes. We also reached out to current and former *Equiery* staff members to find out which covers stand out the most to them.

What we present on these pages is a history of *The Equiery* magazine as told through its covers. Enjoy! And thank you for your continuous support. We could not be what we are today without you.

December 1990



Of course, Issue Number 1, December 1990 is obviously one of my favorites! It was our first issue and co-founder Mercedes Clemens and I were scared to death, but yet oddly confident that we had a grand slam on our hands.

Our concept was simple: we created a portable tack shop/feed store bulletin board, with a free Directory of Riding Stables at its heart.

The simple cover reflected our simple mission—and truth be told, we were inspired by art covers of *The Chronicle of the Horse*—but we wanted to do art differently than those classic *Chronicle* covers, which framed the art in a small space in the center of the cover. We wanted to use the ENTIRE cover. But at that point, we did not know any equine artists—plus, we had no money to pay an artist.

An old college roommate of mine drew this simple horse head as a favor, and we used a standard, free font. We were fortunate enough to actually "sell" ads—rock bottom, introductory rates that kind people couldn't say no to. But it also took some of our own money to get that first issue on the street. So, yeah, it was scary! With the launch of the first issue, we quickly met artists who were willing to let us publish their art on the cover FOR FREE! Wow!

April 1991



This cover was dedicated to Col. Turnabout, owned by my childhood friend, Debbie Hauser. She asked if it would be ok if she might be able to purchase a dedication page for Col. Turnabout in *The Equiery*, even though

it had been three years since he died.

"Of course, Debbie!" I said, "But wait-why

just an inside page, why not the cover!"

And thus was launched a unique sales product with over three decades of cover dedications—each emotional and touching in its own way. Debbie's suggestion also launched one of the most beloved features still running in *The Equiery* today: Greener Pastures. Astute followers will notice that after the first year, fewer covers featured art. Why? Because the waitlist for cover dedications was often well over one year! – *Crystal Brumme Pickett, Founding Publisher*

December 1991



We had made it one year! We celebrated by splurging on spot color. This was the second cover we ran featuring the art of Cathy Kelley, a horsewoman and graphic artist for *The Washington Post Magazine*. Cathy was the

first of our many "Postie" relationships, which included (but is not limited to) writer and editor Kathy Blumenstock (who eventually edited *The Equiery* for a while), the late, great photographer and writer Sarah Libby Greenhalgh, and another great photographer and writer Laurel Scott, who eventually also became an *Equiery* editor. Some of Cathy's clever illustrations created exclusively for *The Equiery* back in the '90s are still in use today.

December 1995







to me, it wins every year.



One thing that has always stood out to me is how supportive the horse industry is to each other and to other causes. People are always willing to step up and lend a hand, or money, as needed and they are always caring and


supporting many causes, not just horsey ones.



In addition to the staff, readers, freelancers and advertisers who have worked together to produce *The Equiery* over the past three decades, there are the interns. These young professionals in the making contributed their own fresh ideas to this magazine. From creating promotional materials, writing articles and coming up with clever cover teasers, among other assignments, these *Equiery* interns have each left their mark on *The Equiery* as much as *The Equiery* has imprinted on them.

Many of these interns came to *The Equiery* with some type of equine background, but in addition brought a variety of passions. After completing their internships, many have stayed in the equine industry while others have gone on to different career paths. As we celebrate *The Equiery's* 30th Anniversary, we also celebrate these interns and caught up with several of them to find out where they are now!




Veronica Green-Gott: Winter 2014-2015

Former Poolesville resident Eve Lloyd Thompson died on October 13 at her home in Wellington, FL, from complications related to dementia and Alzheimer's. She was 86.

A graduate of from Cornell University with a major in Zoology, Thompson intended to become a veterinarian,

but was stymied by her sex and thus subsequently followed a different path: modeling in New York City. She also worked as a buyer in women's sports and leisure wear for department stores in NY and Washington, DC, while continuing her amateur career in horses competing in saddle seat, hunters, jumpers, dressage and competitive trail riding.

In 1967, Thompson married DC dentist Richard K. Thompson, Jr. In 1971, the couple settled in Poolesville, where they bred racehorses and became active members of the Potomac Hunt.

Thompson's tenure as the executive director of the Washington International Horse Show coincided with the shows most glamorous years, when Presidential First Ladies were often WIHS's honorary chairs, when embassies threw parties, ambassadors crowded to attend and black tie was de rigueur. Gracious and dynamic,

Thompson adroitly made sure WIHS remained the social event for Washingtonian society.

During the early years of cable television, Thompson served as color commentator of horse sports for the local cable channel Home Team Sports (later known as Comcast SportsNet Mid-Atlantic and today known as NBC

Sports Washington). She also served as president of the Maryland Horse Shows Association, secretary of the American Horse Shows Association (today the United States Equestrian Federation), chaired numerous AHSA committees, and in 1996 was a member of the FEI Judicial Committee at the Centennial Olympic Games in Atlanta.

Thompson was a founder of the Bernice Barbour Foundation, a significant contributor to organizations working to improve animal welfare in the US, with a significant impact on key veterinary schools. She served on the University of California, Davis School of Veterinary Medi-

cine's first External Advisory Council, which she chaired from 1998 to 2018, becoming the first Dean's Leadership Council Emeriti. In 2005 she received the UC Davis School of Veterinary Medicine Service Award. She also served on veterinary boards at University of Pennsylvania, Tufts University, and Johns Hopkins Center for Alternative to Animal Testing. Thompson was also one of the founders of Animal Grantmakers.

Patricia Ann Straat

Foxhunter and scientist Dr. Patricia Ann Straat died on October 23 at her home in Sykesville after a six-year battle with lung cancer. She was 84. Born in Rochester, NY, Straat became a Marylander in the 1960s when she attended Johns Hopkins University to earn a PhD in biochemistry. She had earned a BA from Oberlin College.

After Johns Hopkins, Straat became a team member on the Infrared Interferometer Spectrometer (IRIS) experiment, which was on board the 1971 Mariner 9 Mission, the first spacecraft to orbit Mars. She went on to be named Co-Experimenter of the Labeled Release life detection experiment on the 1976 Viking Mission, the first spacecraft to successfully land on Mars, and was a member of the Biology Flight Team during the Viking

Mission. Following the Viking Mission, she became a health scientist administrator at the National Institutes of Health, retiring in 2001.

"To Mars With Love," published in 2019, is Straat's memoir about the Viking Mission and her early experiences foxhunting.

Always a "horse girl," Straat discovered foxhunting in the 1970s, was smitten with the sport, and quickly became a member of the now Howard County-Iron Bridge Hounds, participating in every aspect of the club, mounted and unmounted. From an enthusiastic green field member in the back, to club horse shows, social events and hound walking, to serving as a whipper-in and honorary secretary and a governor, Straat touched every aspect of the club. Even after hanging up her stirrups, Straat continued to actively support the club and the sport. Straat and her life partner, Mary Grande, settled on a small horse farm in Sykesville, where Straat could indulge her love of woodworking.

Standarbred owner William "Bill" Leon Spicer died on November 2 at the age of 93. Spicer attended local schools and joined the Merchant Maries as a young adult. He served on ships that delivered troops and supplies for the World War II war effort. When the war ended, he returned to Dorchester County to work for Luthy Farm Machinery.

Spicer married Nancy Malkus in 1950 and the couple had two children. In 1954, he started working at the Spicer Lumber Mill as a mechanic and became owner of the family mill in 1983. He continued the operation until he retired in 1997. After Nancy died in 2016, Spicer began farming with his brother-in-law Ted Malkus.

Spicer loved horses and considered himself a "racehorse man." He spent a lot of time at Gypsy Hill Farms with Marty Burton and his son Brian working with trotters. After retiring, Spicer assisted his son Tommy at Chesapeake Wood Products. Over the years, Spicer owned several horses and traveled to various tracks watching them race on the circuit. He was a member of the Cloverleaf Standardbred Owners Association.






